WORKSHOPS

Recognizing a need for increased co-operative business development in rural and Indigenous communities across western Canada, we've engaged in an outreach campaign to reach economic, business and community development professionals and community leaders across the region.

To supplement their existing business knowledge, we've been hosting workshops focused on increasing co-op knowledge.

TOOLS & RESOURCES

To support co-op business creation, we are developing an accessible and comprehensive platform for co-operative business development, including an online business planning tool.

ONLINE GOVERNANCE COURSE

In partnership with the Centre for the Study of Co-operatives at the University of Saskatchewan, we have created an accessible online governance course.

The first cohort hosted over 480 registrants, with 50 earning a badge and 32 the full certificate.

The goal of this course is to create capacity in rural and Indigenous communities through an increased familiarity with governance theory and practice.

PROVIDING SUPPORT FOR THE CO-OP SECTOR



ARTICLES

We highlight western Canadian co-operatives as much as possible through our blog. Some of our most successful biogs, which have reached hundreds of readers, have been ones that profiled Federated Co-operatives Limited (FCL) or their member associations. FCL featured many of our articles throughout Co-op Week.

WITCONYXE

We partnered with the University of Saskatchewan and Saskatchewan Co-operative Association (SCA) to use an issue-based event to create awareness about the co-op model. We had 90 attendees, mainly women business leaders, youth and young professionals. This event gather a lot of attention and even inspired a follow up event in Saskatoon for Women in Technology.

REGULAR COMMUNICATIONS

Through the strategic use of a CRM and monthly newsletter, we are actively communicating where we are and what we're doing, which provides opportunity for pro-actively engaging and partnering with our friends in the co-op sector. Our monthly newsletter is focused mainly on the co-op sector. It informs readers of what we've been up, what's coming up and provides tools and ideas.

PARTNERSHIPS

The co-operative sector remains supportive of our work and we are eager to continue building partnerships with our friends in the sector. In 2017, we had the opportunity to partner with the team as Saskatchewan Co-operative Association and the University of Saskatchewan. Our online governance course and WITCONYXE are two outcomes from these partnerships.



MAKING AN IMPACT



WORKING TO INCREASE BUSINESS IN THE NORTH

Numerous northern Saskatchewan communities are exploring fuel and grocery retail solutions or business transitions to a co-operative.

A northern BC community has a new community service co-operative incorporated and is about to start offering youth education programming.

Our work with northern communities interested in retail stores and gas stations has led us to connect both FCL member associations and Arctic Co-operatives with these groups. ACL is working with a couple of them to potentially advance a store in Pelican Narrows and explore gas and retail in a few other communities.



EDUCATING DECISION-MAKERS & INFLUENCERS

Community leaders in a southern Saskatchewan town of 300 has been introduced to investment co-ops, how they might slow the loss of small business through succession planning using the co-op model, as well as serve young families in the area through a daycare co-op.

After only 3 Creating Connections workshops, we've reached over 90 economic development professionals across the West. These frontline business development advocates and key players in support systems now have a better understanding of when and how a co-operative can help realize an opportunity for them.

Our online governance course had over 450 enrolled, and provided a badge to 50 students in good co-operative governance practices - 32 of whom earned the full certificate. That's 32 community and co-op sector leaders that better understand co-ops and how they're best governed. Beyond the impressive completion rates, the discussion forums were a lively place to exchange ideas.



HELPING DEVELOP A UNIQUE NEW CO-OP
